

Compare a rākau (tree) to the giant kauri Tāne Mahuta.

*Your mighty tree will be called **te rākau toa** in the following activities.*

Tāne Mahuta

Tāne Mahuta
“Lord of the Forest”
is New Zealand’s largest
known living tree.
He rākau kauri.

Tāne Mahuta
stands tall in the
Waipoua Forest located in
Te Tai Tokerau - Northland,
in the tribal area of
Te Roroa Iwi.

Tāne Mahuta
is estimated to be
between 1250 and
2500 years old.

Tāne Mahuta
measures:
Trunk girth: 13.77 m
Trunk height: 17.68 m
Total height: 51.2 m

Tāne Mahuta is named
after the atua Tāne.

In Te Ao Māori, a Māori
world view, Tāne is one
of the many sons of
Ranginui, the sky father,
and Papatūānuku, the
earth mother.

Tāne was the child that
separated his parents to
create Te Ao Marama, the
world of light. Tāne then
set about clothing his
mother with the forests.

All living creatures of the
forest are regarded as
ngā tamariki o Tāne,
his children.
